Advanced Placement Courses

So, what exactly are AP Courses? These courses better prepare students for doing college-level work while in high school. Depending on the score you earn from the required AP exam at the end of the course, you may even earn college credit while in high school. These are more rigorous courses and students are compensated by receiving more quality points for their grade point average. Six points will be earned for an A, five points for a B, and four points for a C and so on. We offer AP US History and AP English III during the junior year and AP Calculus and AP English IV during the senior year. In addition, there are numerous courses offered online for seniors. Our registration is just around the corner and if you are thinking about applying to a selective school, it's good advice to have some AP course work under your belt. And besides, the senior year is no time to play around. Cost for each AP exam is \$86.00. All students that take the courses, MUST take the exam that goes along with the course.

Project Uplift: a special program that enables high achieving rising seniors to experience college life on the UNC-Ch campus. Students spend two days visiting classes, meeting with faculty and staff, interacting with Carolina students, and participating in cultural and social activities. This year's program will be held on May 20-22, May 27-29, June 3-5, and June 10-12. There is a non-refundable \$10 registration fee; beyond that, Project Uplift is an **all expense paid program**, including meals, room, and program materials (excluding travel costs) Project Uplift is designed for students from under-served communities such as American Indians, African Americans, Hispanic/Latinos, and Asian Americans. They also welcome prospective first-generation college students and individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds. Students should be academically motivated, rank in

the top 25% of their class, be enrolled in a curriculum that includes AP courses, foreign language, and advanced math. Project Uplift Nominees show active involvement in extracurricular activities and have demonstrated leadership. If you are interested, see your counselor today!!

Martha Guy Summer Institute—The program involves

two weeks on Appalachian's campus learning about business, and developing leadership and professional skills. That is followed by a trip to Washington, DC and New York City. The entire experience is described by all as "amazing!" The 2010 Martha Guy Summer Institute is scheduled for July 11 - 31 . Admission to MGSI is limited to current high school juniors who have a sincere interest in business. Applicants should be competitive students among their high school class, shall provide evidence of high school academic achievement, demonstrate involvement in school, and/or community activities, as well as leadership potential. Once applications are received, they are screened and reviewed. Telephone interviews may be conducted to identify finalists, who will then complete a personal interview.

NC Governor's Page Program This is a year-round program that runs each week from Monday at 1pm to Friday at 2pm. IF selected, you would have the opportunity to spend a week in Raleigh and learn about the roles and functions of state government. Each week, Pages are assigned to a cabinet level agency or Council of State office within the state government complex to assist employees with various tasks. In addition to their daily responsibilities, Pages will have the opportunity to meet the Governor, attend press conferences, participate in service projects, and tour historic landmarks. Open to all high school students between the ages of 15 and 18 who are in good academic standing. Pages receive \$150 to cover their expenses during their week of service. 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Sports in College...Visit the NCAA Clearinghouse

Anyone who is interested in playing sports in college needs to be sure to register with the National Collegiate Athletic Association. You must be able to meet academic eligibility and core course requirements. To register, prospective

- www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. From the homepage, you should click on "Prospective Student Athletes" which
- will link to the necessary information.

All students going to a 4-year College or University should have an SAT or an ACT score by the **end of the junior year.** The dates for this spring are:

May 1, 2010 - Last day for regular registration is March 25, 2010. Late registration closes on April 8, 2010. Pisgah offers this May test date. June 5, 2010 - Last day for regular registration is April 29, 2010. Late registration closes on May 13, 2010. Tuscola offers this June test date.

As a senior, you may retake the test in October to try to improve scores. If you have not registered for either test, be sure to visit www.collegeboard.com. For questions, come by the Counseling Center.

Students going to a community college do not need either test but a placement test is required for the community college.



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College planning for juniors

Ask a counselor or teacher about taking the SAT Subject Tests in the spring. You should take them while course material is still fresh in your mind. You can download "Taking the SAT Subject Tests," which offers test-prep advice, from www.collegeboard.com.

If you're in Advanced Placement Program (AP) classes, register for AP Exams, given in May. You can earn college credit for courses not given in the AP Program by taking CLEP tests at a college test center. See www.collegeboard.com to learn more.

Spring

Visit some local colleges—large, small, public, private. Get a feel for what works for you. Attend college fairs, too.

Scan local newspapers to see which civic, cultural, and service organizations in your area award financial aid to graduating seniors. Start a file.

Develop a list of 15-20 colleges that attract you. Request viewbooks and information about financial aid and academic programs that interest you. Visit some colleges over your spring break.

If you're considering military academies or ROTC scholarships, contact your counselor before leaving school for the summer.

Summer

If you are an athlete planning to continue playing a sport in college, register with the NCAA Eligibility Center (www.ncaaclearinghouse.net).

Find a full-time or part-time job, or participate in a camp or summer college program.

Visit colleges. Take campus tours and, at colleges you're serious about, make appointments to have interviews with admissions counselors.

Create a resume—a record of accomplishments, activities and work experiences since you started high school.

Download applications from colleges to which you'll apply. Check application dates—large universities may have early dates or rolling admissions.
