GETTING READY FOR SENIOR YEAR

- 1 Narrow down college choices, and learn more about colleges of interest in terms of majors offered, cost, scholarship opportunities, etc.
- (1) Visit colleges of interest and get an idea of what works for you—small, large, public, private, urban, rural, etc. Meet with an admissions counselor to find out more about the college and what that particular setting can offer you.
- 1 If you are considering military academies or ROTC scholarships, contact your counselor before leaving school for the summer. If you want a four-year ROTC scholarship, you should begin the application process the summer before your senior year.
- (1) Make sure you have all requirements for the colleges which interest you. Some out of state colleges may have different requirements such as 3 units of a foreign language or an arts credit.
- (1) Also consider North Carolina Academic Scholars requirements if this is an honor you wish to obtain.
- (1) If you have registered with the NCAA Clearinghouse, make sure to request a transcript for NCAA Clearinghouse
- D Participate in volunteer work, full-time or part-time job, summer camp, or summer college program.
- ① Continue updating your Portfolio of Activities.
- Download applications from colleges to which you will apply. Check application dates—large universities may have early dates or rolling admissions.

Application Information

Early Decision vs. Early Action

- Early Decisions are binding which means that the student who is accepted as an Early Decision Applicant must attend that college.
- Early Action is non-binding which means that the student receives an early response to their application but they do not have to commit to that college.

Applying early to colleges can be good if:

- Dyou have researched colleges extensively,
- the school is a good match for you academically, socially, geographically, etc.,
- Jou meet the admissions requirements of the college
- I and it can save you stress, time, and expense.

However, applying to early admissions deadlines may have drawbacks such as:

- \Rightarrow pressure to make a decision,
- $\Rightarrow\,$ not allowing you to consider financial aid options at other schools,
- \Rightarrow if you are not accepted by your early decision school, you may not have adequate time to prepare other applications.
