The allusion section of summer reading includes pieces that you should have already read in earlier years. We will be using these reading selections throughout the semester in discussion and analyzation. Most have been assigned in previous Honors/AP courses, so these should be seen as prerequisite reading for the class. The "novel" section is the normal summer reading for the class. You will have a test beginning on day 1 of the semester with the Allusion section, and the tests on the rest of the reading happening over the first week in class. AP Seminar/Language and Composition

AP Language and Composition focuses on the deeper analysis of author's language and structure choices, while also working on a more stylized form of rhetorical writing. Because the focus on language and structure results in a major paradigm shift for our students who have primarily focused on literary analysis, we would like our future students of rhetoric to begin practicing with the concepts. The summer assignment is attached below; we will be utilizing it the first days of school.
