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Course Overview

English I is composed of two major areas of study: grammar and writing, and textual analysis. Because of this, English I uses a variety of texts spanning various formats and genres as a vehicle to teach functional skills such as: reading for information, forming opinions, effective communication, and more.

I. <u>Supplies</u>

III. <u>Reoccurring Assignments</u>

It is important to recognize that part of the reason students struggle with reading is because they lack prior knowledge and background. They can decode the words, but the words remain meaningless without a foundation of knowledge. To help build students' prior knowledge, students will be assigned an Article of the Week (AOW) every Monday. **AOWs** – AOWs will require students to read and annotate a 1-2 page article each week. After which, they will submit a short, written response summarizing the article and their opinion on the topic presented.

IV. Grammar and Vocabulary

English I students will complete a grammar or vocabulary activity upon entering the classroom most days of the week. Activities may range from interactive games, editing and proofreading practice, implementation exercises, quizzes, and more.

V. <u>Missing and Late Work</u>

All assignments are expected to be completed and turned in on the designated due date. If you are absent, be sure to email your work or turn in via Google Classroom. If you know ahead of time that you will be absent, turn it in before you leave or discuss the possibility of an extension with the teacher. Work that is turned in late without prior discussion or verifiable reasoning will receive a zero.

Note: Students will be given an opportunity to make up missing work before each progress/grade report comes out. After progress/grade reports are sent home, any missing work due during that period will remain a zero for the duration of the semester.

VI. Grading
